## **2. No Ordinary Time – FDR, Eleanor and the WW II Homefront: Part 2**

Our study of how the American home front affected the course of WW II and how it altered the face of American life continues. We examine further the unique relationship of FDR and Eleanor Roosevelt.

Franklin's main objective was victory; Eleanor's to preserve the gains of the New Deal and achieve reforms in civil rights, housing and welfare programs. Prerequisite: No Ordinary Time – Part 1. Battered by recession, menaced by China and unable to resolve its immigration dilemma, Kane County and its elders hunger for a solution to economic decline in America. We will invite and question local public officials, policy analysts and 2012 political candidates in a period of increasing American political polarization and indecision. We will study a new book, authored by an eminent economist who offers solutions to our dilemma, led by two facilitators from different political parties. Please read the first chapter before the first class. Vince Schuster was a corporate manager who became a social activist in the formation of Campton Hills. Carl Hays was a corporate manager and CEO who now tries to help elders adapt to the changing world. Limit: 50.

## 7. Dutch and Flemish Painters of the 15th, 16th and 17th Centuries

Of all the great artists who lived in the Netherlands around the 15th, 16th and 17th centuries, we will take a closer look at seven: Bosh (1450-1516), Peter Bruegel (1528-1569), Peter Paul Rubens (1577-1640), Anton Van Dyke (1599-1641), Rembrandt (1606-1669) and Jan Vermeer (1632-1675). The artists' works reflect the historical, cultural and religious changes in northern Europe. Each artist made an impact on the history of his era, as well as the world of art. Janine Webbles has had a lifelong interest in the history of art. Pauline Berberian enjoys researching the various eras and evolution of art. Limit: 30.

## **Depot Museum of Batavia**, 155 Houston St., Batavia

From the stoplight intersection of Route 31 (Batavia Ave.) and W. Wilson St. turn east on W. Wilson St. and then north on S. Water St. The Depot is at the corner of S. Water and Houston streets.

## **Geneva Township Senior Center** 400 Wheeler Dr. Geneva

Four blocks north of the intersection of Rt. 38 and Rt. 31, turn west at Stevens. Turn north at the entrance to Wheeler Park. Park in the lot closest to the brick Geneva Township Senior Center building.

## **Messenger Public Library** 113 Oak St., North Aurora

On the northwest corner of Rt. 31 and Oak St., one block north of the intersection at the corner of Route 31 (Lincolnway) and Route 56 (Butterfield) in downtown North Aurora. Library parking entrance on Oak St. approx. 50 yards west of Route 31.
