In the coming academic year, our ATD coaches will visit Waubonsee three times. This first year will focus on developing an action plan to address key areas identified through thorough data analysis.

We look forward to this opportunity for all employees to be involved in enhancing our student success efforts and making a lasting impact on our students' lives. Achieving the Dream is not just a program; it's a movement towards a brighter future for all. Our proposal, "Empowering Student Wellbeing: Waubonsee's Peer Support Program and Innovations in Mental Health Support," has been accepted for the 2024 ACCT Leadership Congress scheduled for October 23-October 26 in Seattle, WA. I look forward to presenting with Christian Locke, Counselor, and Board Chair Rebecca Oliver. Trustees Patrick Kelsey, Greg Thomas, and Tina Willson, as well as Student Trustee Ashley Hatcher have indicated their plans to attend. This year's Leadership Congress theme is, "Community Colleges as Catalysts: Cultivating Skills for the Future," and promises to be another excellent professional development opportunity.

Our team is also looking forward to attending the Alliance for Innovation and Transformation (AFIT) 2024 Summer Institute later this month. The theme is, "Looking Ahead to Empower the Future Today." Learning partners from the <u>Institute for the Future</u>, <u>Alquist 3D</u>, <u>LAB Midwest</u>, and others will challenge us to consider the impact of artificial intelligence (AI) and emerging technologies and how they are reshaping jobs, organizations, and industries. In addition to considering how we might utilize AI and emerging technologies to enhance the student experience and increase operational efficiency, we will specifically be asking this team to help lead discussions and recommend AI policies at Waubonsee.

Responsibility for New Student Orientation has moved to Student Life and is now tasked with fostering school spirit and community at Waubonsee. This responsibility has brought about changes to the program and environment aimed at creating a foundation for belonging, connecting students' academic and social success to campus resources and services. I look forward to participating as often as my schedule allows.

Recently, I attended Mayor Richard Irvin's second State of the City address in which he highlighted public safety and public engagement. The timing was perfect as we had just hosted an emergency management tabletop exercise organized by Tollway Thunder at our Sugar Grove Campus. Members of President's Cabinet were invited to observe the exercise as we prepare to reinvigorate Waubonsee's emergency preparedness training to help us be better prepared for emergencies such as the recent tornado that impacted our Sugar Grove Campus.

Planning is well underway for our annual <u>Foundation Golf Outing</u> on September 16 at the Aurora Country Club. As in years past, our board is invited to join us throughout the day. In addition, we look forward to hosting our 2nd Annual State of the College on September 24. Launched as part of my Inauguration activities, this event provides an opportunity to share updates with community members and elected officials.
