At our second annual State of the College event on Sept. 24, with a crowd of community stakeholders and local leaders, I was happy to report on Waubonsee's strong enrollment and financial position.

Since enrollment is a series of snapshots in time, the numbers have grown even stronger since then. As of the first week of October, we had almost 10,500 students enrolled across our programs and campuses -- a more than 4% increase from last year.

My State of the College address also marked the first time the priorities of our upcoming strategic plan were shared more broadly with the community. As you know, they are:

- Relevance to the Community
- Invest in Academic Innovation
- Student-Ready College Experience
- Enrich the Employee Experience

Later that week, the college finished up its series of strategic planning feedback sessions with local industries, with a great discussion among several area nonprofits and community-based organizations. My thanks to all who participated.
