Our Achieving the Dream (ATD) journey hit another milestone as we hosted our two ATD coaches, Dr. Cheryl Calhoun and Leon Hill, on Nov. 7-8.

The highlight of the visit was an allcollege session on Nov. 7, where I talked about my personal "why" for wanting WCC to undertake this work, with a focus on ATD as a mindset, a framework, a partner and a resource rather than a singular initiative. Then the coaches gave background information on ATD and what our journey make look like before we opened it up to a panel Q&A.

During the visit, the coaches also met with two key teams comprised of individuals from across the college — the ATD data team and ATD core team. These teams will help surface and prioritize items for the college's ATD action plan. That plan is set to launch at the end of this academic year and be aligned with the college's strategic plan efforts.

The Region 4 Runner of the Year, Valkanov crossed the finish line in a time of 25:45, the fifth fastest 8K time in school history and three seconds better than his previous best time.
