#### Key messages from ATD

#### Student success

Dr. Karen Stout, president of ATD, said "...amplifying our successes and coming together as a collective, is about developing 'waypower' — the waypower that turns hope into a strategic force." She also mentioned the need to reach disconnected populations who are "most skeptical of higher education and most in need of a pathway to a credential of value for them and their families."

#### The *community vibrancy framework*

Community vibrancy combines "outside-in" and "inside-out" strategies to unite college and community transformation and impact. The work we do in our processes and programs, including workforce and civic support for students, impacts individuals, which is where change happens for the larger community.

#### What ATD will help Waubonsee do

- Focus our energy on future action; ask questions to understand how our work and others' work can support students.
- Challenge current processes, let go of what no longer works, and try something new.
- Re-think where we are spending our time and effort. What resources do we have at hand? What is the institutional appetite to take things on? Can we easily acquire the resources in the next few months to carry them out?
- Find more ways to highlight successes and celebrate accomplishments.
- Move from discovery and learning to action our action plan, aligned with RISE 2030, will help us identify those actions and is due to be completed by early June.
- Look at our data differently to find gaps and ask questions.
- Shift from "I" metrics to "WE" metrics
