2022 AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF COMMUNITY **COLLEGES (AACC) OUTSTANDING ALUMNI AWARD:** DR. INDIGO DEBRA TRIPLETT

Dr. Indigo Debra Triplett, a Waubonsee alumna and Waubonsee's 2021 Distinguished Alumnus, was recognized as one of three 2022 Outstanding Alumni Award winners by the American Association of Community Colleges (AACC). Entrepreneur, consultant, and author, Dr. Indigo was recognized May 3 during the Outstanding Alumni Celebration at the AACC Annual Conference in New York City.

A U.S. Marine veteran, Dr. Indigo possesses more than 20 years of experience successfully owning and operating businesses in the United States and Malaysia. Dr. Indigo graduated from Waubonsee in 1988 with an Associate of Arts degree. She continued her education, earning a bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree while working full-time. In 1997, Dr. Indigo founded Careers in Transition, Inc. and was recognized as a Top 500 Fastest-Growing Companies in America by Inc. Magazine in 2012 and 2013 and top 1,000 in 2014.

As a nationally and internationally recognized speaker and author, Dr. Indigo has written three books and contributed to a weekly mental wellness column for Inc. Magazine. She recently owned and operated 4D Performance in Malaysia and has been featured as a wellness expert in seminars, keynote addresses, and radio interviews.

Dr. Indigo has been featured on Fox News, New York Times, Huffington Post, FEMINA, and many other media outlets. Ebony Magazine referred to her as "The \$18 Million Dollar Woman." Dr. Indigo represents the strength and perseverance of many community college students who persist in their education while working and raising a family.

Each year, AACC recognizes community college alumni who have excelled in their chosen fields. The Outstanding Alumni Award is given to recipients who exemplify a community college's ability to change lives.

2022 DISTINGUISHED ALUMNUS: TIM BUCKLEY

The Distinguished Alumnus Award is presented each year to an outstanding graduate of Waubonsee Community College. Awardees have distinguished themselves in their chosen profession, have documented evidence of contribution and service to their community, and demonstrated a continued interest in lifelong education. The 2022 Distinguished Alumnus is 2012 Waubonsee Community College Athletic Hall of Fame Inductee Tim Buckley.

During his 36-year career, Buckley has earned a successful record of accomplishment as a men's basketball coach at eight colleges across the United States. Recently, Buckley signed a one-year contract with the University of South Carolina as an assistant coach. Prior to this, Buckley served as the assistant coach at the University of Nevada, Las Vegas (UNLV). Within Buckley's first season in 2019, the team tied for second place in their division for their best league finish in 12 years. They also defeated the previously undefeated fourth-ranked team for their best road win in 29 seasons. At UNLV, Buckley has pushed players to perform well, both athletically and academically. The team holds a cumulative GPA of 3.1. Buckley's inspirational coaching style helped a UNLV player become the team's first first-team, all-conference honoree in seven seasons. In just one season, Buckley improved the player's scoring average by 17 points per game. In 2020, Jeff Goodman of Stadium named Buckley as one of the top assistant coaches in the Mountain West for his work ethic and commitment to excellence in player development.

Buckley graduated from Aurora Central Catholic High School in 1981 and was recruited by Waubonsee head coach, Jay Bryant, to play on the men's basketball team. "I admired the head coach, I had seen him rise in the ranks from his days as a player, so I followed his career and it was the best decision I could have ever made," said Buckley. At Waubonsee, Buckley found a dedicated support system through Coach Bryant and Assistant Coach, Grayal Gilkey, for his success on and off the court. During his sophomore year, Buckley earned the All-Skyway Conference recognition.

After earning his Associate in Arts in Mass Communication at Waubonsee, Buckley transferred to Bemidji State University, where he graduated with a Bachelor of Science in Communications and a Master of Science in Physical Education. In 2012, he was inducted into Bemidji State University's Athletic Hall of Fame.

SIMON RODRIGUEZ


September 2021 Featured Alumnus

Alumnus, educator, community activist: These are just a few of the words that describe Waubonsee's Featured Alumnus for September 2021. Simon Rodriguez, Jr., is an Army National Guard veteran and the son of immigrant parents from Ciudad Juarez, Mexico.

A 2011 graduate and the first in his family to graduate from college, Rodriguez credits the zeal he has to serve his community today to the support and foundation he received as a student at Waubonsee. Rodriguez is a success story for how he actively seeks to connect and serve his community.

"Waubonsee was the leap I needed for the rest of my life. It was a smooth transition to figure my life out, learn how to set my expectations higher, and reach back to pay-it-forward to someone else," said Rodriguez. He believes his time at Waubonsee showed him that not only could he get a college education but that he could also become a model student to encourage others.

Today, Rodriguez serves as the Youth Services Manager for the City of Aurora. In this role, Rodriguez coordinates and works with community partners to bring various programs to the diverse youth of Aurora. Programs include summer camps, after-school programs, the annual Sports Festival, youth resource fairs, City of Lights tournaments, Youth Court program, the Aurora STEAM Academy, back-to-school fairs, the Aurora Youth Council, mentorship programs, and more.

MOZELLE KEMPIAK March 2022 Featured Alumnus

During her time as a student, Mozelle Kempiak, of Marseilles, earned a reputation as a compassionate competitor as the Waubonsee Women's Basketball Team Captain leading the team to a 2017-2018 Illinois Skyway Collegiate Conference (ISCC) Co-Champion Conference Title her sophomore year. Standing 5'11", Kempiak's basketball career at Waubonsee includes two-time ISCC all-conference honors, two-time National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) all-region honors, and being named NJCAA regional player of the week at least twice. She also set the Waubonsee records for rebounding and doubledoubles.

As a 2018 graduate and the first in her family to graduate from college, Kempiak became a model student, always encouraging others. James Williams, Waubonsee Women's Basketball Coach, believes that Kempiak's humble spirit has taught him and others so much about life.

Kempiak, who battled depression for most of her life, hopes to help patients who have been hospitalized or diagnosed with end-stage cancer overcome depression. Helping people navigate their mental health and overcoming adversities in life is something Kempiak is most familiar and comfortable with. She can relate to their challenges and difficulties.

ROSA BROLLEY June 2022 Featured Alumnus

Waubonsee alumnus Rosa Brolley, of Montgomery, is the daughter of Mexican immigrants and a passionate educator in Indian Prairie School District 204. She lives to teach students from around the world that diversity is beautiful and valuable.

Brolley's earliest childhood memories were built living next to the bustling Chicago Midway International Airport. Brolley can still remember the familiarity of airplanes flying so closely overhead that it felt like you could reach up and touch them as you ate your paleta on the street corner in her Latino childhood neighborhood. In the early '90s, Brolley's family moved to the cornfields of Oswego, devoid of city streetlights and loud noises. This experience was a culture shock to Brolley, who would spend the following years of her teenage life as her parents' language broker and navigator in a foreign world.

At Waubonsee, Brolley was awarded the Gustafson Scholarship for her dedication to pursuing knowledge and her passion for serving the community. There, she discovered the richness of diversity in a new light. Though she was not entirely sure about which career path to pursue, Brolley continued to try new things outside of her comfort zone to find her purpose. She got involved in the Latinos Unidos student group on campus and became a Student Ambassador. She took her first multicultural literature class and it was the first time she learned about authors from other countries.



At an early age, Sullivan was inspired by his grandfather to pursue a career in the automotive industry. ATHLETIC HALL OF FAME

Ivy S. Clark

A lightning quick 6'2" guard, Clark was the cornerstone of Waubonsee's back-to-back Skyway Conference title teams in 1977 and 1978. A two-time All-Skyway First Team performer, he helped the Chiefs go a combined 21-1 in league play those two seasons.

After graduating from Monmouth College with honors, Clark played professionally for a year in Sweden. He returned to Aurora and began working at the Aurora Education Center as an assistant teacher. Working with students there led him to embark on a 30-year career working at the Illinois Youth Center in St. Charles, engaging with juvenile offenders and at-risk youth as a Corrections Officer. Clark retired in 2012 and went back to work four years later serving as Dean's Assistant, helping mentor students at Waubonsie Valley High School for several years.

In 2014 he was inducted into the Monmouth College Hall of Fame. Clark and his wife Anita reside in Aurora and have six children: Candice, Ivy Jr., Morgan, Antonio, Ebony, and Chanelle. These days he stays busy as grandpa to six grandchildren.

2011 Women's Soccer Team Inducted into Hall of Fame

The 2011 Waubonsee Women's Soccer team was the first squad from Region IV to ever win a district title and advance to the NJCAA Division I National Tournament in Melbourne, Florida. The Chiefs finished with 17 wins, one shy of the program record, and were ranked seventh nationally in the final NJCAA poll. Waubonsee captured the Region IV crown with three straight dominating shutouts, and then downed Delta (MI) College in the district title match, out shooting their four playoff foes a combined 94-6 along the way. The Chiefs tallied a team record of 125 goals and established a program record of 111 assists on the season. Nine different players reached double figures in points on the way to tallying a record 361 team points. Overall, 10 different Chiefs earned All-Illinois Skyway Collegiate Conference and All-Region accolades, with Head Coach Leslie (Ferguson) Raney being named the Region IV Women's Soccer Coach of the Year. In the end, the 2011 Chiefs broke nearly every program record that fall, 14 of which still stand today.

"Waubonsee provides work-based learning, apprenticeship programs, and skill attainment to support employers' rapidly shifting needs," said Suzette Murray, Assistant Vice President of Education and Workforce Development. "Strong relationships with employers assist students with faster entry into the labor market."

Students enrolled in Career Technical Education (CTE) programs have ample opportunities for paid apprenticeships and internships through Waubonsee's customizable approach to bridge the gap of learning and working through creative curriculum design with employers in the community. Waubonsee's Business, Technology, and Workforce Education Department has a solid relationship with local industry partners, including the Valley Industrial Association (VIA). VIA works with schools to create a sustainable manufacturing workforce.

Through Waubonsee Works, a Workforce Innovation and Opportunity Act program funded through the Kane County Department of Employment and Education, the college improves the lives of individuals ages 16-24 by tailoring its support to meet individual and employer needs locally and regionally.

PLANS UNDERWAY FOR NEW CTE BUILDING ON SUGAR GROVE CAMPUS

Waubonsee is pleased to announce that plans for the new CTE building project has advanced, gaining the support of the Board of Trustees through the selection of a construction management company and continued planning internally through the involvement of key community partners. DUE DILIGENCE IN A POST-PANDEMIC WORLD

Waubonsee Community College has continued to follow the highest and most up-to-date protocols along with existing layered, evidence-based prevention strategies to help prevent the spread of COVID-19 on campus. During the 2021-2022 academic year, we proudly served our community by providing free testing to everyone on campus along with numerous free, walk-in community COVID-19 clinics, and free contract tracing services to any student or employee who is a confirmed or probable case of COVID-19.

While the Illinois Department of Public Health continues to promote vaccines and boosters as they significantly reduce the severity of COVID, students or employees are not required to show proof of vaccination or be tested regularly.

We strongly believe we have a shared responsibility for maintaining a safe environment for ourselves and others. We are excited that all in-person events are back and we continue to take the highest levels of precaution to ensure the health and well-being of our college community is a top priority.

REMOVING STUDENT FINANCIAL BARRIERS

As part of the Higher Education Emergency Relief Fund, Waubonsee processed over \$10 million in awards to 4,458 students seeking assistance since Spring 2020.

PARTNERSHIP WITH KANE COUNTY SHERIFF'S OFFICE TO PROVIDE EDUCATIONAL **OPPORTUNITIES FOR THE INCARCERATED**

Waubonsee Community College recognized two graduates, Anthony C. Medina and Skyler A. Garcia, who received their High School Equivalency (GED) certificates this summer.

The partnership between Waubonsee and the Kane County Sheriff's Office was built and launched in August 2019 to provide instructional services for individuals currently residing in the Kane County Jail. It follows a national trend towards providing educational opportunities to incarcerated individuals to obtain the necessary skills and knowledge to enter high-demand employment fields upon release.

"Adult Education in a corrections setting works! It is shown to reduce recidivism and give individuals an opportunity to put their background behind them and move forward," said Adam Schauer, Dean for Adult and Workforce Education.

According to a 2013 study, researchers have found that inmates who participate in correctional education programs have 43 percent lower odds of returning to prison than those who do not. The estimate is based on studies that carefully account for motivation and other differences between correctional education recipients and non-recipients. The study emphasized that employment after release was 13 percent higher among inmates who participated in either academic or vocational education programs than those who did not. Those who participated in vocational training were 28 percent more likely to be employed after release from incarceration than those who did not receive such training (Bozick 2013).

Medina and Garcia faced a myriad of challenges as they received instruction inside the Kane County Jail. They each had to overcome barriers to learning while being incarcerated and persevere through an unprecedented year of disruption to their class schedule because of COVID-19 lockdowns.

"My stepdaughter just got her [diploma] in 2021, so it's like, man, I can share this with her now. It means the world to me, honestly. I'm going in the right direction," said Medina.

"I'm the first person in my family to get my GED, so it means a lot to me. None of my family has graduated, so it means a lot to get it. It is pretty exciting," shared Garcia.

Waubonsee continues to see success through its partnership with the Kane County Sheriff's Office. Nearly half the students enrolled in Waubonsee's High School Equivalency Program (across four Kane County Jail housing units) have seen a measurable skill gain after obtaining 50 hours of instruction.

2022 DISTINGUISHED CONTRIBUTOR: DIANE D. HOMAN, M.D.

The Distinguished Contributor Award is presented each year to an individual, a group of individuals, or organizations who have made an outstanding contribution or given exemplary support to Waubonsee Community College. Those nominated have supported the college's operations in either a personal or professional capacity and have contributed to the growth and expansion of the college's mission. Nominees for the award are recognized by the college staff, community residents and officials, or college leaders as having made an extraordinary commitment to promoting the college and its mission.

The 2022 Distinguished Contributor is Diane D. Homan, M.D. Dr. Homan joined the Waubonsee Foundation Board of Directors in 2005 after serving as a community judge for the Waubonsee Community College John J. Swalec Jr. President's Achievement Award. The task of the five-member community judging panel was to interview and select recipients for several cash awards in a day-long process. Dr. Homan has served as Scholarship Committee Chair since 2010 and, in 2017, became a member of the Nominating and Governance Committee.

As Scholarship Committee Chair, Dr. Homan was instrumental in transforming the scholarship application process from a paper process to a fully digital process. Implementation of a fully electronic scholarship application at Waubonsee created a user-friendly experience for Waubonsee students which was particularly important when all services at the college suddenly needed to transition online due to a global pandemic. Students can apply for more than 300+ Waubonsee Foundation scholarship opportunities anywhere, anytime online through the streamlined process. Last year, under Dr. Homan's leadership, the Scholarship Committee also approved the implementation of a second scholarship deadline during the academic year to increase access and remove barriers for students seeking scholarships. The second deadline provides additional time for high-school seniors, first-generation students, or those less familiar with standard academic scholarship processes to complete their application and still have access to vital financial support through scholarships.

While the number of annual Foundation scholarship applications submitted by students fluctuates each year, one thing remains constant, Dr. Homan's dedication. She has reviewed thousands of student scholarship applications, each time looking for the opportunity to plant seeds financially for a deserving young person or adult who otherwise may not be able to attend college without the support of the Foundation Scholarship Program.

Dr. Homan's 38-year career as a board-certified physician exemplifies her passion for service through outstanding patient care, education, research, and community partnerships. Serving as the medical director at Health Care Service Corporation (HCSC), Dr. Homan oversees the Blue Cross and Blue Shield (BCBS) Association, which operates BCBS Plans in Illinois, Montana, New Mexico, Oklahoma, and Texas. She is responsible for expanding access to high-quality, cost-effective health care and equipping members with information and tools to make the best healthcare decisions for themselves and their families.

Dr. Homan earned her Bachelor of Science in Biology and Nursing from Purdue University. She earned her medical degree from Indiana University School of Medicine and later completed a fellowship and residency at Rush-Christ Family, specializing in obstetrics, family practice, and faculty development.



DECORATED VETERAN AND NATIONAL CYBERSECURITY EXPERT ENCOURAGES **GRADS AT COMMENCEMENT**

Since 1968, Waubonsee Community College has awarded has awarded more than 28,000 associate degrees. And newly added to this number are 877 members of the Class of 2022. It is no secret that many of these graduates have navigated obstacles and overcome barriers once believed impossible in higher education.

Waubonsee's commencement speaker this year, Brian Olson, Chief Information Security Officer, North America for the Northern Trust Corporation, a \$12.2 trillion global financial services firm, offered graduates an inspiring message and one they could relate to personally. His opening line commanded everyone's attention, "I owe my entire existence to this institution."

The decorated veteran and graduate of the United States Military Academy at West Point, NY, earned a degree in computer science. However, long before he would ever become a cadet and a commissioned offer in the Army, he first enrolled in courses at Waubonsee. During his remarks, Olson shared that he believes the general education courses he took at Waubonsee truly prepared him to succeed at West Point and beyond.

At Northern Trust Corporation, Olson is responsible for overseeing and managing Northern Trust's cyber and information security programs, including Threat Management, Data Protection, and Identity Management operations. He has over 15 years of experience in information security operations in the defense and financial sectors. He served as the first Head of Cyber Threat Intelligence at Zurich Insurance Group, a Global Fortune 200 Company, where he established a global threat intelligence program.

Olson served in several positions while a commissioned officer in the United States Army primarily focused on communications and intelligence. His service culminated as Commander of the US Army's first Dynamic Cyber Defense Company, a strategic effort to reorganize the Army's cyber defense capabilities.

His awards and decorations include the Bronze Star Medal, Meritorious Service Medal, Joint Service Achievement Medal, and the Iraq Campaign Medal (3 campaign stars).

WAUBONSEE VITA PROGRAM OFFERS FREE TAX HELP TO COMMUNITY

2022 AMERICAN ASSOCIATION OF COMMUNITY COLLEGES (AACC) DALE P. PARNELL AWARD: DAVID VOORHEES

David Voorhees, Professor of Earth Science and Geology, was recognized with the AACC's Dale P. Parnell Distinguished Faculty designation. Recipients of this faculty distinction are recognized as individuals who go beyond what is required to ensure that students succeed in their academic endeavors.

Voorhees has served as a full-time Earth Science and Geology faculty member at Waubonsee since 2002. Voorhees' passion for teaching geoscience education is evident through the many opportunities he pursues to increase student learning and engagement in and outside of the classroom. Voorhees earned a bachelor's degree in Economics from the University of Rochester and a Master's of Science in Geology from the Rensselaer Polytechnic Institute.

Voorhees has also brought real-time seismic data into geoscience classrooms and labs using a simple seismometer included in the Educational Affiliate membership of Incorporated Research Institutes for Seismology (IRIS) that he obtained for Waubonsee. Since 2005, he has cataloged over 1,200 earthquakes that have formed an extensive database used in many Earth Science and Geology classes and two student honors projects. Voorhees uses the observation wells in the wetlands adjacent to Waubonsee's Sugar Grove Campus in Geology labs and a "flipped" Earth Science class. Several students have completed honors projects that included these seismic data and the observation wells and have successfully entered Skyway STEM poster competitions.






Denise Nakaji, Professor of Massage Therapy





GRAND OPENING OF LATINX RESOURCE CENTER

According to a 2019 report by Excelencia in Education's Latino in Higher Education: Compilation of Fast Facts, half of all Latinos in the U.S. (44%) were the first in their family to attend college as compared to any other ethnic group.

It is not that Latino culture or Latino families do not value education; the vast majority do. Often, the lack of college-going role models in working Latino families is the first challenge among several, multi-layered factors preventing student success, including socio-economic disadvantages, clashes between cultural norms, and familial expectations. This leads to a lack of support for many first-generation Latino students who enroll in college courses but lack the guidance to finish a degree.

Waubonsee is home to more than 30% of students who identify as Latinx from across our region. We are committed to helping Latinx students reach their educational goals and earn degrees.

This past spring, Waubonsee's Latinx Resource Center (LRC) was launched at the Aurora Downtown Campus to our internal and external college community. The LRC is an identity-based center that provides resources, support services, and educational experiences to support students' academic and social success.

We offer all students a place to belong and to learn more about Latinx cultures, heritages, and traditions.

ACCREDITATION UPDATES

Waubonsee's accreditation is completed through the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) Open Pathway, a 10-year cycle of accreditation. In July 2021, Waubonsee successfully completed the fourth year of the Assurance Review, a 125-page self-study that is externally reviewed by a team of commission peer reviewers. The college met all five of HLC's criteria with no concern. A summary of the college's accreditation work can be found on the college's website at waubonsee.edu/accreditation.

In addition, Waubonsee successfully met all criteria to maintain the status of "recognized" by the Illinois Community College Board (ICCB), which means that the college meets all ICCB standards and is eligible to receive state grants appropriated through the ICCB.

COUNCIL ON ADULT AND EXPERIENTIAL LEARNING

Last year, Waubonsee formed a partnership with the Council on Adult and Experiential Learning (CAEL), a nonprofit that works with colleges and universities to align programs and services with the academic needs of adult learners, and Inside Track, a national student coaching success model, to increase enrollment and completion rates among Latino, first-generation, and adult learners at Waubonsee.

The facilitators and the Inside Track team visited campus, and a college assessment and evaluation were conducted to identify strengths and areas of opportunity. CAEL's work will include enhancing the use of credit for prior learning at Waubonsee which saves students time and money while increasing completion. The program is made possible by a \$3 million grant awarded through Title V.



Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion -A Community of Practice Where Everyone Belongs

Waubonsee is intentional about creating an inclusive college culture where diversity is celebrated, honored, and a place where people can find belonging. Diversity is not a theory, it's an everyday community of practice where we intentionally:

Together, they put the importance of people's stories, experiences, and histories at the forefront. We will continue to listen and implement changes to make our initiatives both relevant and useful for all.




