A MESSAGE FROM THE PRESIDENT



When I wrote my president's message for our 2020 Annual Report to the Community, I referenced Charles Dickens' book, *A Tale of Two Cities*, to capture the feeling of a year interrupted and disrupted by a global pandemic. At that time, I would never have imagined that we would still be referencing infection and hospitalization rates a year later. During my annual State of the College address for employees at the start of the 2020-2021 academic year, I shared the unofficial theme, or advice, of "Expect and Embrace Disruption." And we were certainly disrupted; as individuals, as departments, and as an organization. Yet through this disruption, our commitment to providing learning has never wavered. We know that education has the power to change lives. And, the needs of individuals and organizations within our community have only grown with the economic impact associated with the pandemic.

As we worked within changing state and federal mandates, we were dedicated to maintaining our sense of community, high quality service, and the care that Waubonsee is known for. We continue to be equally committed to quality improvement. And when transformative events of 2020 highlighted ongoing social and systemic inequities within our society, Waubonsee responded making significant enhancements to our processes and procedures to further remove barriers for students.

It also shares our progress as we have completed year two of our current Strategic Plan focused on priorities within the three pillars of Student Equity and Success, Community Connections, and Employee and Organizational Excellence.

In closing, I'd like to share an aspirational story that several of us created while attending a virtual conference. We were given the assignment to imagine the Waubonsee of the future and tell a story of who we hope to become in the first person as the college. It reads:

"I am Waubonsee Community College, and I'm the top choice for learning in my community. I'm so proud of all the changes we have implemented since the COVID-19 pandemic. It's easy for anyone to get started on their college journey by reaching out to me at one of my four campuses, or from their phone, or wherever they are in the world. When you are part of my family, you feel respected, valued, cared for, and your success is my success. I'm proud to help students achieve their dreams, whether they are pursuing a four-year degree, a new job, or learning a new skill. I listen to your hopes and dreams and concerns. And my programs reflect what you and future employers are looking for in an employee. I provide integrative learning so that everything you need is available within your Waubonsee experience. My name means "Early Dawn," and I will help you find real-time knowledge that is relevant to you now and in the future. I am quality. I am value. I am innovation. I am service. I am accessibility. I am learning like no other."

IN MEMORIAM

Waubonsee Community College Board of Trustees Chair Emeritus Richard “Shorty” W. Dickson, passed away on November 9, 2021. Mr. Dickson served on the board from 1972 until 1987 and then again from 1989 until April 2019. In those years he served as an officer of the board for 40 years, 29 years as chair, and 11 years as vice chair.

During his lifetime, Mr. Dickson oversaw remarkable achievements through his participation in more than 750 board meetings and nearly 50 commencement ceremonies. A conservative estimate of the number of volunteer hours he provided to the college is 5,000 hours.

The impact and influence of Mr. Dickson’s heartfelt advocacy to promote Waubonsee as a significant and vital part of the region remains seen today. Mr. Dickson volunteered his personal time to build a web of strategic partnerships, relationships, and friendships that put the college at the educational, workforce, social, cultural, and economic center of the community by consistently putting the college’s mission in front of decision makers at the local, state, and national levels.

The Dickson Center, dedicated in honor of Mr. Dickson in 1987, which stands on the Sugar Grove Campus, will forever be an emblem of his remarkable commitment and dedication to Waubonsee.

DISTINGUISHED ALUMNUS

The Distinguished Alumnus Award is presented each year to an outstanding graduate of Waubonsee Community College. Awardees have distinguished themselves in their chosen profession, have documented evidence of contribution and service to their community, and demonstrated a continued interest in lifelong education.

Dr. Indigo Debra Triplett is the 2021 Distinguished Alumnus. A U.S. Marine veteran, Dr. Indigo possesses more than 20 years of experience successfully owning and operating businesses in the United States and Malaysia.

Dr. Indigo graduated from Waubonsee in 1988 with an Associates in Arts degree. She earned a bachelor's, master's, and doctoral degree while working full-time. In 1997, Dr. Indigo founded Careers in Transition, Inc. and was recognized as a Top 500 Fastest-Growing Companies in America by Inc. Magazine in 2012 and 2013, and top 1,000 in 2014.

As a nationally and internationally recognized speaker and author, Dr. Indigo has written three books and contributed to a weekly mental wellness column for Inc. Magazine. She has recently owned and operated 4D Performance in Malaysia and has been featured as a wellness expert in seminars, keynote addresses, and radio interviews.

As the founder of a multimillion-dollar organization, Dr. Indigo has been featured on Fox News, New York Times, Huffington Post, FEMINA, and many other media outlets. Ebony Magazine referred to her as "The \$18 Million Dollar Woman."

Dr. Indigo presents the strength and perseverance of many community college students who persist in their education while working and raising a family.

2021 American Association of Community Colleges (AACCC) Outstanding Alumni Award

Each year, the AACCC recognizes community college alumni who have excelled in their chosen fields. The association is the primary advocacy organization for the nation's community colleges. It represents nearly 1,200 two-year, associate degree-granting institutions and more than 12 million students.

Waubonsee Community College alumna, Kristen Ziman, was one of three selected for AACCC's 2021 Outstanding Alumni Award. Ziman graduated from Waubonsee with an Associate in Applied Science degree in 1993. She earned a Bachelor of Science degree from Aurora University in 2003, a master's degree in criminal justice management/organizational development from Boston University in 2008, and a master's degree from the Naval Postgraduate School Center for Homeland Defense and Security. She has also completed training sessions with the Senior Management Institute for Police at Boston University, the FBI National Academy, the Harvard Kennedy School of Government, and the Kellogg School of Management.

Ziman was sworn in as an Aurora Police Officer in 1994. She was a community policing officer from 1997-1998 when she was selected to develop and implement a Domestic Violence Reduction Unit (DVRU) and was a DVRU detective from 1998-2001. Ziman was also a member of the Aurora Police Honor Guard from 1999-2001. She was a field training officer from 2001-2003. In 2003 she was promoted to Sergeant and became the coordinator for the field training program. In 2008 she was the first female in the department's history to be promoted above the rank of Sergeant when she was promoted to Lieutenant. She was promoted to Commander in 2010. As Commander, she designed and implemented the performance management system, created the burglary task force, and held community forums to keep the public informed. Ziman was named the Aurora Chief of Police in 2016.

In addition to her more than 25 years of police service to the community, Ziman serves her profession through service on boards such as the Illinois Law Enforcement Medal of Honor Committee, the International Association of Chiefs of Police Community Policing Committee, the International Association of Chiefs of Police Executive Board, and the Illinois Sentencing Policy Advisory Council.

Ziman is a perfect model of the graduates that community colleges produce every day. Ziman was also named the 2019 Waubonsee Community College Distinguished Alumna to recognize her personal, academic, and professional success.

Five Modalities of Learning

At Waubonsee, students are empowered to select the best learning environments that suit their life from traditional to ultra-flexible options. Through My Choice, students can choose to learn with five different learning modalities:

1. **Face-to-Face:** Classes meet in a traditional classroom setting on one of Waubonsee's four campuses.
2. **Online:** Courses are delivered 100% asynchronously online through Canvas, Waubonsee's Learning Management System.
3. **Hybrid:** A blend of face-to-face class meetings in a traditional classroom and asynchronous online learning through Canvas.
4. **Sync Online:** Classes meet on regularly scheduled days and times via Zoom, allowing students to engage with faculty and peers in real-time.
5. **Flex:** Classes meet face-to-face in a Flex-equipped classroom and are simultaneously live-streamed and recorded through Zoom. After each class, the Zoom recording is posted in Canvas so that students may view or review each session online. For each session, students may engage in-person in the classroom, virtually via Zoom, or online asynchronously, according to their preferences and needs.

Student Life Programs

Waubonsee students took advantage of many ways to engage and enrich their collegiate experience through Student Life and Student Organizations last year. They completed an impressive 244.5 hours of community service in the 2020-2021 academic year.

From filling up boxes of goods to sponsoring 11 children in need in our community through a partnership with Fox Valley United Way, to participating in meaningful work through various other charities, 131 total students volunteers all made a difference for someone in need this past year.

Additionally, several student leaders in Student Life and Admissions answered the call to serve their peers by mentoring incoming students through the New Student Orientation, a presentation designed to acquaint new students with what to expect and how to succeed at Waubonsee. Student leaders sat as panelists, shared their experiences, and answered questions, making new students feel welcomed and supported before classes ever began.

Engaging Leaders

At Waubonsee, students seeking to strengthen their leadership skills can get involved, become inspired, and pay it forward with the new perspectives available through The Engaging Leaders Program. The Engaging Leaders Program is one of many programs that help students understand, develop and strengthen their leadership. Participants can learn from weekly guest facilitators, as well as from their peers' experiences.

One of the highlights of the program is Waubonsee's Conversation with Campus and Community Leaders. Students hear first-hand experiences from diverse members of the community. The panel acts as a mirror for Waubonsee students to see themselves reflected in leadership roles. Ultimately, students can see the impact that they can make in the community as it reinforces the concept that being a leader takes many forms.

Counseling and Advising Model Combined with Career Counseling

At Waubensee, students seeking counseling, advising, or career counseling don't have to go to multiple individuals and offices for expert help. Now, thanks to Waubensee's new approach to counseling and advising, all students receive care and guidance from one person, their assigned advisor from the first day they start class at Waubensee to the time they graduate. This individual is trained across disciplines to assist them with career exploration, choosing a major, making career decisions, finding and applying to internships, etc.

This new model removes the need for students to re-explain their story or find extra time outside of their schedule to book an appointment with multiple staff members. It also helps the advisors identify and prioritize students in their caseloads who may need support.

In a survey to evaluate the effectiveness of this new advising model, 90% of students at Waubensee indicated they had improved their academic planning skills and understood how their major pertains to career options. Waubensee's Academic and Career Advising model was featured for its success in the April 2021 Career Leadership Collective & AACSB academic paper titled, *Integrating Career Advising for Equitable Student Success: A higher education landscape analysis*.

ALL IN Democracy

During the 2020-2021 school year, Waubensee joined the ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge to encourage students to use their voices in the electoral process. Students participated in numerous civic engagement events to learn about the U.S. political system and how to make informed decisions. The ALL IN Campus Democracy Challenge demonstrates that civic engagement goes far beyond a vote. It starts with being involved in the local community. As a result of the continued participation of Waubensee students in these types of civic events, voter participation across the Waubensee 516 District has increased.

The college received the Bronze Seal for increasing our voter engagement for the 2016 elections. A bronze seal means Waubensee's voter participation fell within 49.5%-59.4%. Waubensee increased our participation by 6.9% from 2021 to 2016 and had a 51.2% participation rate. The seal is based on Waubensee's National Study Learning, Voting and Engagement (NSLVE) reports and is coordinated by the Institute for Democracy and Higher Education located at Tufts University.

Waubonsee's Academic Support Model

The constant changes of the pandemic provided a unique springboard to accelerate a modernized approach to support students by removing physical barriers tied to building service hours, access, and transportation. Waubonsee administrators, support staff, and faculty collaborated to reimagine a student support model centered around innovation and flexibility. This new approach yielded limitless opportunities to meet students right where they are with no assumptions about their online knowledge, comfort with remote classes, access to reliable technology, or costly textbooks. We started from ground zero and built service models from that basis, resulting in the creation and launch of new programs and resources, including:

ONLINE NAVIGATOR PROGRAM

Waubonsee's Online Navigators are dedicated staff members who help students navigate Canvas, utilize third-party tools, other technologies, and connect students to campus resources. Students have seen them as a class confidant, someone to turn to for an objective opinion, and helpful resources to become more engaged during their online sessions. In the case of moving to fully online during the pandemic, Online Navigators helped mitigate the transition for students who did not initially sign up for online courses.

MYMATERIALS (INCLUSIVE ACCESS)

Although many institutions discuss the cost of tuition, they often neglect to discuss textbook affordability with the same enthusiasm. Waubonsee recently launched MyMaterials, a partnership between Waubonsee faculty, staff, the on-campus bookstore, and various publishers to deliver digital textbooks and course materials to students at a low price on the first day of class. To date, we have collaborated with faculty from various divisions and expanded MyMaterials to 40 courses across the college and 337 course sections, leading to an impressive \$93,305 cost-saving to students. MyMaterials has allowed Waubonsee to provide textbook affordability while improving student outcomes and eliminating the confusion of purchasing the wrong materials.

LIBRARY GRAB-AND-GO SERVICE

Waubonsee's Library Grab and Go makes accessing materials as easy and convenient as possible for all users, remote or limited in-person. When it is time to search for materials, all Waubonsee students can take advantage of convenient library item pick-ups and returns, peer-to-peer tech support, and live chat with a librarian. Additionally, students can check out laptops, webcams, and other needed technologies. Students can even request books to be delivered to their homes via the USPS at no charge.





Following the commencement, graduates and their families lined up their decorated vehicles, honked horns, and waved congratulatory signs in a drive-thru grad parade to affirm the unprecedented challenges they overcame in the 2020-2021 academic year.



Grads Inspired at Virtual Commencement by Cole Wright, Cubs Host

Waubonsee hosted a virtual commencement to celebrate the achievements of 935 individuals. Of that number, 23 graduated with two degrees. Fifty-three students earned Presidential Honors of a 4.0 GPA, and 300 earned Academic Honors of a GPA between 3.5 and 3.9. Seven students graduated from Waubonsee's Honors Program. The youngest graduate was 17 years old, and the oldest was 62 years old. The average age of this class was 26. The average GPA of this group of students is 3.24, a tremendous collective accomplishment.

During the virtual ceremony, graduates received an uplifting and inspirational message from commencement speaker, Cubs host, and former Waubonsee athlete Cole Wright. Wright joined Marquee Sports Network as a studio host upon the launch of the network in 2020. He serves as the primary host for the Cub's pregame and postgame coverage on Cubs Live! He also hosts and contributes to the additional original Marquee programs, including Cubs 360 and Cubs Classics. Wright spent the previous five years as an anchor and host with NFL Network.

Before attending Waubonsee Community College, Wright graduated from Waubonsie Valley High School in Aurora, Illinois, and transferred to Briar Cliff University in Sioux City, Iowa. He earned a degree in communications. Mr. Wright was a student-athlete in Waubonsee's baseball program. He held the record for game-winning hits in a single season and was inducted into the Waubonsee Community College Athletic Hall of Fame in 2018.



25th Anniversary of Horizons Magazine

This past year marked the 25th Anniversary of Horizons, an annual literary magazine designed by students in Waubonsee's Creative Writing Club. The publication is a blend of fiction, nonfiction, poetry, and drama, showcasing the written, visual, and musical work of Waubonsee students. It provides students and artists an opportunity to have their work published professionally and master the art of collaboration across disciplines.

Each cover of the 2021 issue represents the duality of living, learning, and working through the pandemic. One cover represents the darkness of these times, and the other represents the resolve to move forward into a new and brighter world.



Faculty Development – ACUE Certificate, 2nd Course Teaching Excellence

When Waubonsee’s partnership with the Association of College and University Educators (ACUE) began, the college actively sought to close achievement gaps for African-American, Latinx, and low-income (Pell-eligible) students. No instructor in higher education could have predicted the sudden pivot to virtual learning that became necessary in the wake of the COVID-19 pandemic.

ACUE exists to meet the needs of the evolving 21st-century classroom through their Course in Effective Teaching Practices© developed in collaboration with hundreds of college educators and leading experts for face-to-face and online instruction. The timing of this partnership could not be better.

Over 40 Waubonsee Community College faculty, ranging in disciplines from math to nursing and everything in between, signed up to participate in ACUE’s national certificate program. Our first cohort was comprised of half adjunct faculty and half full-time faculty. This diverse cohort concretely demonstrated that ACUE’s effective teaching practices not only aided content experts in learning educational practices but in furthering all educators on their lifelong learning journey— under extraordinary circumstances.

The faculty who pursued the option to enroll in the ACE Graduate Credit Course, The Fundamentals of Teaching and Learning in Higher education, also engaged in additional graduate-level coursework, implementing online resources embedded in the ACUE course, and received mastery in the Online Teaching Toolkit© that ACUE made available to educators nationwide, including:

- First Day and Interactive Class Session Plans
- Peer Review of Class Session Plans,
- Comprehensive Syllabus Assignment
- Teaching Philosophy



Athletic Hall of Fame

Dave Randall, the long-time former head baseball coach, alumnus, and administrator at Waubonsee Community College, was inducted into the Chiefs' Athletic Hall of Fame.

Randall was the Chiefs' head baseball coach for 37 seasons from 1978 through 2014, with 20 of his teams ranked in the top-15 nationally. He led Waubonsee to 895 wins, at the time, the second-most ever by a National Junior College Athletic Association (NJCAA) Division III baseball coach. Randall guided his teams to six Illinois Skyway Collegiate Conference (ISCC) titles, despite being the only non-scholarship program in the conference at the time. He was named the ISCC Coach of the Year seven times while also leading the Chiefs to three Sectional titles, five Region championships, seven Region runner-up finishes, and four NJCAA Division III World Series appearances. Randall's 1996 squad finished second nationally, while he directed the Chiefs to third place in 2013, fourth place in 2014, and seventh in 2010. Randall also coached cross country in the late 1970's and early 1980's. He even went 1-0 as a soccer coach, guiding Waubonsee's women's soccer team to one of the biggest upsets in Region IV history in 2002, knocking off seventh-ranked and undefeated (18-0) Harper College.

In addition, Randall served as Waubonsee's Athletic Manager from 1984 until his retirement in 2015, overseeing the Chiefs' 13 sports programs. Over the years, he also worked as the ISCC Baseball Chairman, the NJCAA Region IV Code of Conduct Chairman, the Region IV Baseball Chairman, was an NJCAA Baseball Coaches Association Committee member, and was Director of the Region IV All-Star game for over 20 years. Randall was inducted into the Illinois Baseball Coaches Association Hall of Fame in 2002, the Region IV Hall of Fame in 2005, and the ISCC Hall of Fame in 2015. He was selected the Chicago Hit and Pitch Club Junior College Coach of the Year in 1996 and was named Waubonsee Distinguished Alumnus of the Year in 1984.

Diversity, Equity, and Inclusion Accomplishments

Waubonsee has been busy at work implementing new Diversity, Equity, Inclusion (DEI) initiatives. In addition to the appointment of a Chief Diversity Officer, the college adopted a framework to ground our DEI work and help the college stay focused on being strategic.

The American Association of Community Colleges DEI framework for action call us to Define, Assess, Communicate, Education, Implement, and Include. FY2020-2021 for Waubonsee was about defining.

We sought out to define DEI and specifically come up with a shared understanding of equity. Waubonsee also established the Sustained Dialogue Series, offering three dialogues per semester that deepen our understanding of DEI topics in a supportive environment.

Faculty, staff, and students participated in over ten sessions last year centered on three sustained dialogue themes. Waubonsee streamlined our Cultural Programming by establishing a new committee structure and increased funding for the events and programs. The Council for Access and Inclusion continues to meet and set DEI priorities for the college. Planning is underway to establish more robust training opportunities for the college and an internal policy review. The college developed a training centered on Gender Pronouns which is available for faculty and staff to complete. As a result of the third Title V grant, the Latinx Resource Center staff were hired, paving the way for establishing the center at our Aurora Downtown location.

Diversity is an intentional appreciation of differences expressed in countless forms, including race and ethnicity, gender and gender identity, sexual orientation, socioeconomic status, language, culture, national origin, religious commitments, age, (dis)ability status, and political perspective.

Equity is the practice of intentionally working to ensure that individual or social circumstances are not obstacles to achieving one's potential. This is reflected through our policies and processes at the college which acknowledge the need to actively remove barriers and create opportunities for success for each individual within the Waubonsee community.

Inclusion is the intentional commitment to being a college where individual differences are welcomed, honored, and respectfully heard and where all individuals feel a sense of belonging at Waubonsee.

Ongoing Pandemic Relief Management

As the area's community college, Waubonsee Community College recognizes the economic hardships experienced by its residents and students due to the ongoing pandemic. In response, we have leveraged the college's financial strength to benefit both our students and our taxpayers.

In the Spring, we launched a Spring Forward scholarship of \$40 per credit hour for every registered student and an application-based Pandemic Relief Scholarship. In addition, the board endorsed maintaining a level tuition and fees rate for the academic year 2021-2022. The current in-district tuition rate of \$132 per credit hour will remain in effect through 2022, as will the current student fee of \$8 per credit hour. Waubonsee's combined tuition and fees rate remains below the state average for Illinois community colleges, reflecting the board's ongoing commitment to affordability.

Relief to District 516 Taxpayers

In the 2020-2021 academic year, Waubonsee Community College provided District 516 taxpayers an aggregated savings of nearly \$9,000,000 on their property tax bills. Waubonsee has committed itself to keeping the college accessible and affordable.

We will continue to work with all of our stakeholders to maintain and strengthen the college's financial footing while providing outstanding education and services to our students and the district.

Title V Hispanic-Serving Institution (HSI) Grant

Waubonsee is one of three colleges in Illinois and the only community college in the state, to receive a \$3 million Title V grant in this funding cycle.

With more than 30% Latinx students, the award funding expands educational opportunities for Hispanic and low-income students by bringing additional resources to the community. The grant will enhance the transition from high school to college through dedicated academic advisors, increase student participation in financial literacy education, and newly developed work-based learning programs for Waubonsee employees to increase cultural competencies. This is the third time the college has received a Title V grant from the Department of Education.

Sobek, President of Waubonsee Community College, proudly hosted the Ambassador of the Grand Duchy of Luxembourg to the United States, Gaston Stronck, and Mr. Kevin Wester, former Executive Director of the Luxemburg Cultural Society in Belgium, Wisconsin, on Friday, June 11, 2021, at the college's Sugar Grove Campus.

Plano Renovation





Von Ohlen Campus Renovations

In addition, 2020 saw the remodel of Von Ohlen Hall, which was originally constructed in 1974 to be the Music and Arts building and continues that primary function.

The Von Ohlen Hall Remodel project commenced the project with construction work starting in April 2020 and ending in October. The original objective for the project was to update the building's very dated finishes. Still, during the programmatic review, many opportunities were identified to improve the functionality and accessibility of the building. The band, choir, and art studio spaces all received significant storage system upgrades, and lockers large enough for student portfolios were added to the hallways. In addition to the cosmetic and functional/storage improvements, many areas were altered to be fully accessible for all students. The darkroom and little theatre were overhauled to be made fully accessible. The under-utilized dressing room spaces were converted into a gender-neutral single-occupant restroom and a wellness room. Other noteworthy improvements were the new display cases for artwork and glass magnetic markerboards lining the hallways for displaying student artwork.



Tree Campus Higher Education

For the 10th consecutive year, Waubensee Community College has earned the Tree Campus Higher Education recognition by the Arbor Day Foundation. The Tree Campus Higher Education program honors colleges and universities for promoting healthy trees and engaging students and staff in the spirit of conservation.

Currently, there are 403 campuses across the United States with this recognition. Waubensee is committed to promoting sustainability and improving the environment. Receiving the Tree Campus Higher Education recognition is evidence of this commitment.

Sugar Grove Campus

Higher Learning Commission Visit

Waubonsee is part of the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) Open Pathway, a 10-year cycle of accreditation. HLC is one of six regional accrediting bodies in the United States.

In June, the Higher Learning Commission (HLC) conducted a comprehensive Multi-Campus Visit at Waubonsee's Aurora Downtown and Plano Campuses. Visits are conducted every five years by an HLC peer reviewer and are a requirement for institutions with three or more off-campus locations.

The primary goal of these visits is to ensure that additional campus locations provide the same level of academic quality and student support that exists at the main campus location. The college was found to have successfully met the standard for multi-campus locations at both locations that were evaluated.

In June of this year, Waubonsee submitted an Assurance Review, a self-study in the fourth year of the ten-year HLC Open Pathway cycle. The Assurance Review is an opportunity to demonstrate adherence to five HLC Criteria on which all affiliated institutions are evaluated:

1. Mission
2. Integrity: Ethical and Responsible Conduct
3. Teaching and Learning: Quality, Resources, and Support
4. Teaching and Learning: Evaluation and Improvement
5. Institutional Effectiveness, Resources, and Planning

Waubonsee's Assurance Review met all HLC criteria with no concern. These successful HLC visits reaffirm Waubonsee's commitment to quality and continuous improvement, consistent with our mission, vision, values, and stated goal of *being the top choice for learning in our community.*




